Sisters of Saint Joseph – Beginnings in France

n mid-seventeenth century France, all circumstances were ripe for new birth in the Church. Because ✓ Father Médaille's original letter to the superior of the Jesuits has not been found, the only thing we know for certain is that Médaille went beyond the activities prescribed for the Jesuits on mission by founding a group of women. These women could not help but be conscious that they were innovators.

hat Jean-Pierre Médaille, SJ, and the women of his early groupings did was to design the structures to enhance living their charism. Between 1646 and 1650, the project begun by Father Médaille and these groups of women began to evolve. One community established itself in the orphans' hospital in LePuy while another began in the parish at Dunières. In October of 1650, Bishop de Maupas of Le Puy gave what is considered the official approval to the sisters in the hospital.

 $m{B}$ ishop de Maupus writes of our first sisters as widows and young women who desired to consecrate themselves to the admirable exercise of charity in the service of the hospital for the poor of the community as well as in education and the orientation of orphan girls. The bishop goes on to say, "...we permit these widows and young women to create a Congregation under the name and title of the Daughters of Joseph; to meet and live in community in one or various houses, according to what seems necessary...that the new congregation may prosper." The bishop's openness to their expansion provided the space for growth he never imagined.


Prayer for the 140th Anniversary of the Sisters of Saint Joseph — 1873-2013 and Beyond...

Sisters of Saint Joseph of Boston — 1873...2013...and beyond



The Sisters of Saint Joseph arrived in Boston on October 2, 1873. During the year ahead, our board prayers will reflect on the history that brought us to this moment as well as to a future without a prescribed set of blueprints but one open "to a God coming to us from the future" in ways we have yet to imagine.

Our prayers will focus on the Sisters of Saint Joseph

- I. beginnings in Le Puy, France, during the turbulent times of the midseventeenth century
- 2. renewal in Lyon, France after the French Revolution
- 3. coming to the United States during the great expansion to the New World
- 4. arrival in Boston in response to the needs of a growing immigrant population
- 5. Sisters of Saint Joseph mission and spirit now and into the future.

Mission Statement:

We are ordinary women from all walks of life. Our special focus, our mission, is to work for unity and reconciliation where there is brokenness, to help people become whole and holy, individually and together.

In 2005 we articulated this mission in the following statement

Enflamed

with the compassion of God, we Sisters of Saint Joseph of Boston, women of the Church, rooted in the Gospel together with our Associates are impelled by the active, inclusive love of God to: deepen our relationship with God and the dear neighbor without distinction; foster prophetic communion; and journey into the future with Sisters and Associates throughout the world and with all God's creation.

Ministries:

Since our arrival in Boston in 1873, we have staffed over 130 educational institutions, worked in over 30 health care ministries, and participated in over 85 service ministries within the Archdiocese of Boston. You will meet Sisters of Saint Joseph of Boston in shelters, food pantries, parishes, schools, hospitals, nursing homes, retreat, chaplaincy, campus ministry centers, refugee services, literacy programs, programs for at-risk youth, and more. We are a community of vowed apostolic women with a contemplative stance toward life

2013 and beyond:

oday, those who are attracted to this vision still live among the people and offer their lives in love and service. The Sisters of Saint Joseph of Boston carry on the heritage of their foundresses, six French women who joined a Jesuit priest in 1650 to begin a community without cloister or habit and devoted to the needs of their neighbors. Today they continue to a profound desire for union with God and the "dear neighbor".

The tradition of loving service that began in LePuy, France, during the mid-seventeenth century and continued in Boston in 1873 sustains them as they live into the twenty-first century. Instinctively, they identify with the cries of a world stunned by violence to reopen communication in divided communities, to search for shared values, and to empower individuals to explore common ground for the healing of humankind.

The Sisters of Saint Joseph are women receptive to the stirrings of the Holy Spirit of Love. Together with their Associates they are called to live in right relationship with all creation. They are a community of women whose mission is to realize the prayer of Christ that all may be one. In community and prayerful contemplation they listen to this Spirit and move always toward profound love of God and love of neighbor without distinction.
